

Dear Garden Park Ward,

I recently made a trip to North Salt Lake to visit a piece of property that had belonged to my great-grandfather Bennett Peterson. Bennett joined the church in Mississippi as a young man and followed the missionaries that taught him back to Utah. After several years of saving, he managed to buy a rocky, raw piece of land. Improving that piece of land became his life's work. Over decades he cleared the land, built a home, developed irrigation systems, and planted fields, an orchard, and a vineyard. Bennett's first wife Addie May had five children before her untimely death. Bennett remarried, and his second wife Florence had 11 more children. Together, they built a thriving, productive farm through relentless, hard work.

One day, while Bennett and Florence were away, one of their daughters tried to use kerosene to help start the kitchen fire. The can of kerosene exploded and burned the house to the ground. The house had to be rebuilt, so Bennett and Florence took a loan for \$5000, offering the 120 acre farm as collateral. The timing of the mortgage could not have been worse. A year into repayment, the Great Depression began, and earning the money to repay the loan became exceedingly difficult. Bennett, Florence, and their children poured everything they had into their work, struggling to save the beautiful home and farm they had built out of nothing.

In the midst of the effort to save the farm, Bennett was called on a full-time mission to the Southern States. I can hardly imagine a more insensitive and illogical decision by church leaders. With seven children still at home including a baby, and facing the very real threat of losing the farm, Bennett truly could not afford to leave home.

It's incredible to me that Bennett and Florence decided he should accept the call. He served a fairly unremarkable mission, with no convert baptisms. The only noteworthy success was reuniting with some of his extended family in Mississippi and gathering some genealogical records. And his sacrifice and service produced no financial miracles of the kind we like to hear. With Bennett gone, more mortgage payments were missed, and the Petersons lost the farm.

When I first heard about Bennett's mission call, I could not believe the audacity of the church leaders who extended the call at such a difficult time. I've since come to understand what an inspired call it was. It gave Bennett and Florence a chance to reflect on where their treasure was. It allowed them to hit pause in their frantic effort to hold on to material possessions. They probably would have lost the farm either way, and when they eventually did, they had already demonstrated to themselves, their children, and the Lord that there were things they valued far above their farm. In the end, losing the farm wasn't devastating for the family. They knew the things they truly treasured could not be taken away.

At times I find myself getting caught up in "the thick of thin things," chasing after material possessions and accumulating accomplishments. But three generations later, Bennett's and Florence's decision still inspires me and gives tangible meaning to Matthew 6:19-21. "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal: But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven.... For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." During this strange and challenging time, I hope we can all find success in keeping our hearts fixed on the treasures that have true eternal worth.



- ◆ The Bountiful temple is performing live ordinances by appointment only. Please refer to the church website for more details and updates on ongoing changes.
- ♦ Sacrament Administration from our Area President, Elder Holzapfel: "The sacrament can be offered to families who have not had the opportunity in their homes . . . The First Presidency has authorized the administration of the sacrament at least monthly." The sacrament may still be blessed and passed by your own family members that are able to do so. If you would like the sacrament brought to your home, please contact Relief Society President Kathy Younker (801.971.1504) or Elders' Quorum President Doug Bunker (801.910.7128), and they will help make arrangements for you to receive it.
